

CAPTAIN'S MESSAGE:

Richmond District,

As I'm sure many of you have seen on TV and read in the news, auto break-ins have been on the rise over the past few years. In an effort to stem this increase in crime, the Officers of Richmond Station have implemented foot and bicycle patrols in the most affected areas. These increased patrols serve two purposes, acting as a visual deterrent to would be thieves and better positioning officers to apprehend suspects.

Across the city, each of the 10 SFPD district stations will now have a plain clothes team of officers dedicated to the reduction of property crimes. Officers assigned to the plain clothes team will be working to identify potential auto burglars and apprehend them before they damage vehicles and take people's property. These officers will focus on the hardest hit areas, and while you may not see them, they will be watching out for thieves!

Residents of the Richmond District have been clear about the impact auto break-ins are having on their quality of life, and the Officers of Richmond Station have heard you loud and clear. We are committed to doing everything we can to take the individuals responsible for these crimes into custody.

DEFINITION OF SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.

DEFINITION OF COMMUNITY POLICING

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

Homeless Outreach: Richmond Station Officers coordinate with city agencies to provide assistance and offer City services as needed. The Officers handle quality of life issues and find programs for willing individuals.

Foot Patrol: Richmond Station has dedicated foot patrols on Clement St., Geary Blvd, Golden Gate Park as well as the Cliff House.

Richmond Station Community Meetings: Community Meetings are held once a month for the public and residents of the Richmond District to attend. People can voice their comments or concerns about issues in the Richmond District.







Definitions

Robbery– Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault— An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery- (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(Felony battery) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

**<u>Assault</u> is when a person swings their arm and <u>battery</u> is when that arm makes contact with another person. **

Aggravated Assault—Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.


Burglary– The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft– Grand Theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

The suspect stabbed the victim one time in the right bicep. The suspect fled in an unknown direction.

The victim was not sure of the exact location of the incident. The victim thought it was near Ocean Beach, inside Golden Gate Park. The suspect in this case is still outstanding and described as a white male adult, 25-30 years old, brown hair and unknown clothing.













The above pie chart represents the time of day auto boosts occur.



Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team

(ALERT)



Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Three Ways To Become An ALERT volunteer:

After clearing a basic background check you will be eligible to register for one of our triannual ALERT training classes as follows:

- 1. Complete two 8 hour classes with ALERT, or,
- 2. If you are already NERT Certified, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT, or,
- 3. If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT.

San Francisco Police Make Arrest in Mission District Homicide

On January 11, 2018 at 8:14 PM, San Francisco Police officers responded to 1200 block of Potrero Avenue regarding a person who was stabbed and bleeding from the neck and torso. Upon arrival, officers found the victim, Mark Anthony Camacho, a 59 year-old San Francisco resident, suffering from multiple stab wounds. The San Francisco Fire Department paramedics responded and rendered aid. Unfortunately, the victim succumbed to his injuries and was pronounced deceased at the hospital by medical professionals.

An investigation by the SFPD Homicide Unit led to the identification and arrest of the suspect within 24 hours of the initial incident. On January 12, 2018, SFPD officers arrested Jesus Ramirez, a 48 year-old San Francisco resident. Ramirez was booked into the San Francisco County Jail for murder. Due to pending identification matters, the suspect's photo will not be released at this time.

Although there has been an arrest made, investigators are asking anyone with information on this case to contact the San Francisco Police anonymously at 415-575-4444 or text-a-tip to TIP411 with SFPD at the start of the message.

San Francisco Police Make Arrest in Taraval District Homicide

On January 12, 2018 at 10:34 PM, San Francisco Police officers responded to the 300 block of Randolph Avenue regarding a person who just stabbed his mother. Upon arrival, officers found the victim identified as a 67 year-old San Francisco resident, Noda Nasser, suffering from multiple stab wounds. The San Francisco Fire Department paramedics responded and rendered aid. Unfortunately, the victim succumbed to her injuries and was pronounced deceased at the hospital by medical professionals.

An investigation by the SFPD Homicide Unit was initiated. Officers from Taraval Station were able to promptly identify the suspect and make an arrest within 24 hours of the initial incident. On January 12, 2018, SFPD officers arrested Islam Moustafa, a 32 year-old San Francisco resident. Moustafa was booked into the San Francisco County Jail for murder. A booking photo accompanies this media release.

San Francisco Police Recover Skates and Figure Skating Dresses Stolen in January 8th Auto Burglary

On January 8, 2018 at approximately 8:00PM, an auto burglary occurred on the 1600 block of Webster Street, in San Francisco. During this incident, a suitcase containing figure skating dresses and ice skates belonging to professional ice skater were stolen.

The Department began an investigation after the victim filed an online report. District Station personnel located evidence that provided several leads in the investigation that was performed by the Burglary Detail.

On January 14, 2018 at approximately 4:45PM, members of Central Police Station's Street Crimes Unit conducted an investigation which produced additional information leading investigators to recover the stolen figure skating dresses and ice skates. The Department is working to reunite the victim with her property.

This recovery of the stolen items was a combined effort of the SFPD Investigations Bureau, Burglary Detail and District Station personnel and is part of the Department's ongoing strategy to reduce auto burglaries. This strategy includes the "Park Smart" crime prevention program, intended to educate the public about not leaving valuables in parked cars. SFPD District Station captains and the Burglary Detail have been working with community and business groups to educate the public on crime prevention strategies aimed at reducing auto burglaries.

In addition to crime prevention efforts, the Department has almost doubled the number of foot beat officers whose mission is to help deter crime, make arrests and further educate their local communities regarding crime prevention tips.

Types of Crime Reports That Can Be Filed Online:

- Harassing Phone Calls: When you are experiencing annoying calls with no known suspects; for example, hang-ups or heavy breathing.
- Lost Property: When property has disappeared and not stolen. If you think it could
 have been taken but you have no idea by who, you may enter the report online.
- Theft: When property is stolen but there has been no illegal entry or contact by the thief.
- Vandalism/Graffiti: The act of changing, modifying or defacing public or private property, including graffiti.
- Vehicle Burglary: When property was stolen from a vehicle.
- Vehicle Tampering: Tampering with a motor vehicle, including vandalism/graffiti of the vehicle.

Calling the Police:

Dispatchers ask questions in a particular order for a reason. It is best to stay calm and answer all questions to the best of your ability.

Complaint: Location, Hazards (ie. weapons at scene), Victim info (sex, age, condition)

Suspect Description: Gender, Race, Age, Clothing, distinguishing features

Vehicle Description: Color, Make, Model, License Plate, distinguishing features
